In the age of imbedded reporters and rampant media coverage, the voices of veterans themselves have thus far been conspicuously absent. Bruce Lack is a young writer joining the discussion of the Iraq War and its impact. Born and raised in mid-Michigan, Bruce served honorably in the United States Marine Corps from 2003-2007. He deployed twice, spending twenty-one months in Fallujah, Iraq. His poetry is informed by his experiences in Iraq as well as the long adjustment process from Marine to civilian. Please join him for a reading of his work followed by an informal question and answer session.</i>  <i>Bruce Lack graduated Magna Cum Laude from Western Michigan University in 2011. He is currently a Cornwell Fellow in the University of Michigan's MFA Program in Poetry.
